LEADERSHIP AND COMMUNITY IMPACT

Serving the community since 1972, Tempe Community Council works in partnership with the City of Tempe and community organizations to serve as a planner, advocate and resource to improve the funding and policies affecting human services in Tempe and surrounding communities. The work of the Tempe Community Council includes direct service projects and programs, program development and planning, promoting and encouraging community engagement and volunteerism, grant administration and community outreach and advocacy.

Program Development and Planning:

Gather and analyze community population/demographic data to develop human service plans and programs to benefit the community for human services based on projected community needs. Mobilize community participation in identifying and developing solutions for meeting human service needs and help create policy to improve the situation for Tempe residents; includes the incubation of programs that address unmet community needs when no other resources are available.

Community Engagement/Volunteerism:

Engage the community to promote volunteerism in support of TCC's projects and its' nonprofit partner activities and leverage resources, programs and services to address unmet community needs; includes the recognition of volunteers, inclusion of those with disabilities; safe and healthy environments for youth and seniors; Tempe Karma and other activities as prioritized by the Board of Directors.

Grant Administration:

Provide grant administration support, training for compliance, and partnerships with human service agencies awarded contracts by the City of Tempe and grants from the Tempe Community Foundation. Ensure efficient and effective implementation of needed human services; coordinate quarterly meetings with regional partners to network, share information, trouble shot and problem solve; issue and initiate Request for Proposals (RFP) consistent with traditional procurement processes; distribute RFP's, review applications, interview agency representatives and develop recommendations for Tempe City Council. Includes Agency Review and other grant administration, such as; SACA, Diversity/Unity grants, 5310, TCF, H2O, City of Tempe and CDBG monies.

Community Outreach/Advocacy:

Promotion of TCC and vital human service issues through outreach, public relations,

AGENCY REVIEW

One important role for the Tempe Community Council (TCC) is to distribute and manage human services funding on behalf of the <u>City of Tempe</u>.

For the 2010/2011 fiscal year, TCC convened a review panel of 56 dedicated volunteers who made recommendations to Tempe City Council totaling \$1,019,006

Fund sources include: City of Tempe General Funds, federal Community Development Block Grant funds (CDBG), utility donations through TCC's <u>Help to Others (H2O)</u> program and endowment funds from the <u>Tempe Community Foundation</u>.

Focus was put on nonprofits who provide services in these key six categories:

- Homeless Shelter & Services
- Domestic Violence Shelter & Services
 - Programs for the Working Poor
- Programs for Those with Developmental Disabilities
 - Youth Prevention & Programs
 - Senior Programs

PROGRAMS

Communities in Schools of Tempe and Kyrene (CIS) provide a number of critical services to the youth that go to school with the boarders of the Tempe Union High School District. Some of these services are: Family Resource Centers, which are located at seven Tempe elementary schools, and who served more than 6000 students and their families by providing clothes, food, health services, books, backpacks, training, and education for parents; A.C.E. Club, which provides support to high-risk middle school students in the Kyrene District. This past year, 25 students at Kyrene Middle School increased their attendance and decreased their referrals for problem behaviors, giving them a much better chance at future success; and at the high school level, CIS has supported high-risk teens at Compadre High School by providing a part-time counselor who delivered individual or group counseling to 116 students. The students who received counseling were much more likely to graduate than those who did not, 87% vs. 66%.

Open Horizons Teen Parent Scholarship Program (OH) provides childcare scholarships for the infants/toddlers of teen parents in the Tempe Union High School District making it possible for them to stay in school. Currently, over 200 teens are pregnant or have recently given birth. These students face a dropout rate of 80% (national average). With the help of Open Horizons, the **eight students** that received the scholarship **successfully graduated from high school** (added to OH's overall graduation rate of 5.8% over 20 years of the program).

Tempe's Financial Stability Initiative (formally know as, Earned Income Tax Credit Initiative) has been providing free tax preparation and financial literacy programming to low-income individuals and families for ten years. We originally started with a handful of volunteers in an unused store front in Arizona Mills, but have now grown into a "supersite" with the partnership of Tempe Schools Credit Union (who graciously allows us to use their building during tax season). Last year, 100 volunteers prepared 825 federal and 839 state tax returns, bringing \$1,752,062 in federal and state refunds back to low and moderate income families. In addition, there were 898 inquiries into asset development and financial literacy initiatives, which we believe will help end the cycle of poverty for these clients.

Shared Living Village provides housing, food, utilities, and community for low-income seniors who may not have the benefits of extended family and friends. At the Village, we know that a key to independent living is community. Isolation leads to depression, which eroded senior's ability to life a long and happy life. Last year, **16 seniors** called Shared Living Village their home and we hope that their experience leads to friendship and the independence they deserve.



Over 340 volunteers dedicated their time and talents to Tempe Community Council's mission of **connecting those in need with those who care**. A value of \$145,318.25!
