

Former Mayor Giuliano selected as 2014 Don Carlos Humanitarian

TEMPE, Ariz. (Aug 29, 2014) - Tempe Community Council (TCC) is pleased to announce former Tempe mayor and current San Francisco AIDS Foundation CEO Neil G. Giuliano as the 2014 Don Carlos Humanitarian. Neil will be presented with this honor at the 31st Annual Don Carlos Humanitarian Award Ceremony and Dinner on Oct. 15, 2014, 5:30-9:00 p.m., at SRP's PERA Club in Tempe.

"I am deeply touched and humbled by this recognition, considered the most meaningful and special recognition bestowed upon a member of the community," Neil posted on his Facebook page. He added, "And I will accept it on behalf of the many who serve others every day without recognition of any kind."

Neil was selected from an impressive list of nominees. Both locally and globally, Neil is a leader, volunteer, philanthropist, activist, author and advocate for people of all walks of life. He began providing community service while in high school where he volunteered in the Key Club. His community service continued through college and into his professional life as an employee of ASU and the mayor of Tempe.

As Tempe's youngest mayor, he led the community towards unparalleled growth while also enhancing and instilling a humanitarian vision that still drives our community today. He initiated many programs including a People Improvement Program and established a human relations commission, neighborhood improvement and engagement program, and youth advisory committee. During his tenure he also ushered in projects such as the Tempe Town Lake, Tempe Center for the Arts, Rio Salado urban development plan, and the light rail. Because of Neil's leadership, the National Civic League named Tempe the 2003 All-American City.

Neil is an active advocate of social justice and equality for all individuals. As the first openly gay mayor of Tempe, he helped lead the march towards ending discrimination and defamation in the community. After coming out, he became national president of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD). Currently, Neil is the CEO of the San Francisco AIDS Foundation where he promotes awareness of AIDS and addresses the stigmas and hate associated with the disease.

Also being recognized is the Kiwanis Club of Tempe as the Guiding Light Lifetime Achievement in Philanthropy Award recipient, Gwen Hanna as the Spirit of Tempe Karma Award recipient, and a Young Humanitarian Scholar.
