Lack of Affordable Healthcare
Serious Illness or Disability
Addiction Disorders
Mental Illness

Definition / Examples

Definition: An individual who lacks a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence*

Are These Examples of Homelessness?

- · Living in an emergency or transitional shelter
- Living in cars, parks, abandoned buildings, bus/train stations
- Living in motels, hotels, camping grounds

 More than half a million individuals needed emergency shelter or transitional housing.


 At least 300,000 were under the age of 18.

- Street Count
- Shelter Count
- Doubled Up

Tempe - 2009/10

- There are 155 Tempe homeless on streets
 - 2010 = Total of 155 individuals
 - 2009 = Total of 138 individuals
- I-HELP (2009/10) (TCAA)
 - 422 unduplicated homeless individuals were provided approximately 12,775 bed nights
 - Approximately 12,775 meals were provided by volunteers
 - 165 clients engaged in Case Management Services
 - 45 clients obtained vital documentation
 - 101 clients obtained government benefits
 - 75 clients obtained employment
 - 60 clients obtained housing

Homeless/Domestic Violence e-Cimpact Data – TEMPE only

- FY 09/10 actual #s
 - 35,664 units served
- Funded \$615,884, which is 53% of overall COT funding
- 15 agencies in two service categories
- FY 09/10 4th quarter <u>actual</u> #s
 - 7,352 units served;3,099 turned away;471 on waiting list


1. Families and Children*

- Fastest growing group of homeless individuals
- In Arizona, 1,244 sheltered families, with an average of 3.2 persons per homeless family
- Usually a single woman who is, on average, in her late 20s with two children, one or both under the age of six
- Among mothers with children experiencing homelessness, more than 80% had previously experienced domestic violence



2. Victims of Domestic Violence

- Estimates show that half of homeless women and children are fleeing domestic violence
- In Tempe 299 reports for 4th quarter
- Average 8-9 times to leave
- Locate out of community
- Economy fewer victims leaving

3. Chronic Homeless

- An unaccompanied individual who suffers from a disability such as mental illness and has either been continuously homeless over the past 12 months or homeless at least four times in the past three years
- Utilize over half of all shelter system resources
- Tempe 2010 point-in-time survey showed
 97 males and 23 females

4. Individuals with Substance Abuse Disorder

- 35% of 5,869 sheltered adults and unaccompanied youth were reported as experiencing chronic substance abuse problems.
- 27% also reported to suffer from mental illness

5. Individuals with Mental Illness

- 19% of the 5,869 sheltered homeless adults and unaccompanied youth who were counted are believed to be seriously mentally ill (SMI)
- SMI: Chronic depression, bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, or serve personality disorder.
- Most individuals with SMI live at or below the poverty line

6. Rural Homeless

- Often referred to as the 'hidden homeless.'
- In large part due to lack of affordable housing and inadequate income

7. Older Individuals

- 296 persons over age 65 in emergency shelters and transitional housing.
- Largely a result of poverty, premature disability and declining availability of affordable housing.

Continuum of Care

- Defines homelessness as a variety of unmet needs
- Includes: Outreach and assessment, supportive services, emergency shelter, transitional housing, permanent supportive housing, permanent affordable housing, and community education and advocacy
