To the Tempe Community,

Community

The Agency Review (AR) process was initiated in 1985 by Tempe Community Council (TCC) on behalf of the City of Tempe with the goal of being community-driven, fair, transparent, accountable, and defendable in distributing Tempe tax dollars to support human services for its residents. The City of Tempe cares about all social service providers and social issues in its community. No one issue is more important, nor more worthy of investment than another. We are extremely proud that Tempe leads its peer communities by having such an extraordinary level of involvement of its citizenry in this process each year.

The collective sources of Agency Review dollars are essential to offer supportive services not already provided through the City's Human Services Department. External partner agency programs funded through the AR process complement the great work already being offered by the City.

Each year, the AR process is competitive, and every year, the volunteer reviewers remark on the high caliber of programs and funding applications submitted. However, difficult decisions must be thoughtfully made as part of the AR process. It is our community-centric approach to funding services and programs how we come to consensus for these recommendations.

As we return to a pre-pandemic workplace, the transformation of social service delivery continues to evolve. The non-profit sector has demonstrated agility through the upheaval of COVID-19. Many agencies have launched new services, expanded existing services, or changed how they operate and serve their communities. Creativity with communications, technology, and even fundraising is evident. Notably too, is the number of agencies who have increased their work around the deep social inequities that have been illuminated through these times, and many are using this moment to advocate for systemic change.

Many agencies also report they are concerned the needs of the most vulnerable are outpacing the capacity to serve, especially at a time when they were already underfunded prior to COVID-19. Agency partners are piecing together funding from many resources to serve our citizens. In some cases, our financial contribution to their programs' budget is less than 10%, yet our citizens are welcomed and have full access to all services and programs.

Our non-profit partners are very grateful for the City of Tempe's financial support and diligently seek other partnerships to ensure continuation of services. Their creativity and collaborations serve all of us well. However, as funding sources become scarcer and COVID grants end, the issues in our community continue to increase.

This year, agencies have requested \$2,243,990 (a 12% increase over last year's request of \$1,998,956) and \$1,102,610 over the anticipated budgeted amount of \$1,141,380.

Our AR community volunteers together recommended distribution of the estimated \$1,141,380 be provided to 43 agencies with 52 programs serving Tempeans in need. Those services include programs that serve people experiencing homelessness, the working poor, survivors of sexual and domestic violence, individuals with disabilities, youth, and older adults.

While partner agencies have been stepping up to the challenges again this year, volunteers - the lifeblood of many nonprofit organizations - have also been leading the way by stepping up to help during this pandemic. For TCC and the City of Tempe, over 55 volunteers were trained to participate in the AR process this year. These volunteers dedicated over 1,100 hours over a four-month period, to participate in a survey, read and evaluate grant proposals, interview agencies, and to make funding recommendations to present to Tempe's City Council. After this stage of the process, these volunteers will attend site visits, participate in community roundtable discussions, and may become involved with TCC board committees.

As co-chairs of TCC's Community Impact Committee, it is our privilege to assist with the distribution and monitoring of the human services funds on behalf of the City of Tempe.

Tempe Community Council is committed to doing its part in the coming year to raise additional funds to support the city's human services investment, and we will continue to improve on the funding process to prioritize meaningful outcomes.

We would like to thank and acknowledge our volunteers who dedicated their time and valuable insight to this process, to the agencies who applied for funding, as well as the TCC staff who assembled the information and managed the process.

Together we are fulfilling TCC's mission of connecting those in need with those who care. Together we are Tempe.

FUNDING SOURCES

Projected Human Services Funding Sources for Fiscal Year 2022/23

The City of Tempe is generous in their support of human services. For FY 22/23 the City of Tempe will contribute \$1,100,000 in unrestricted funds to provide human service funding through this process known as Agency Review. Tempe Community Council (TCC) engages citizens living and working in Tempe to provide recommendations for these funds to Tempe City Council. In FY 2021-22 City Council committed to providing a static amount of \$100,000 be added to the total General Fund amount to replace the Display Panel Revenue which fluctuated annually. For FY 22-23, City Council provided supplemental funds of \$187,740.

Together Tempe Funds - Utility Bill Donations

Throughout the year, the City of Tempe provides an opportunity for citizens to support Together Tempe by including an additional dollar or more through their monthly utility bill payment. This past year, \$40,000 was generously donated by Tempe residents through this effort and is being included as a funding source for this human services distribution in FY 2022/23. Thanks to the dedicated utility customers of Tempe who have given each month over the year. Collectively, their dollar donations provided a significant contribution and will have a positive impact on the programs and services being offered to Tempe residents through the Agency Review process.


Together Tempe Funds - TCC Contribution

FINAL SCORE AND FUNDING REDUCTION FORMULA

Final Score

To determine a **Final Score** each program application was evaluated and rated as listed below. One portion of the scoring includes the priority survey results of target populations, as determined by the community at large. This year, a comprehensive community needs assessment was conducted by Corona Insights, a Denver-based research and consulting firm. The effort was commissioned to evaluate human services need in Tempe at a time when the Covid pandemic was still at its height. Respondents, which include residents, service providers, business, faith groups, civic organizations, first responders and city employees, along with community experts helped to rank service priorities.































What did you learn during your volunteer experience that you would share with people who are thinking about volunteering next year?

- Review the written materials again just before the interview date.
- Always learn about a new agency serving Tempe
- Print out the applications so you have something to refer back to and easier to take notes. I
 know it's a lot of paper, but I used it to recycle and printed on the blank side
- Great way to learn about our community
- It's a very valuable experience, and you can learn a great deal while also contributing to the community.
- Always learn about a different social service agency in Tempe.

- This volunteer opportunity opened my eyes up to a wide variety of services and programs in our city, which I was not aware of. It was a wonderful learning experience, as well as thought provoking.

- An understanding of non-profit staffing and fundraising challenges is helpful in evaluating an application.

If you could make any changes to the Agency Review process, what would you change?

• I would like further consideration about how funding is allocated. The practice so far has been to partially fund as many programs as possible, but most of them are being funded at 50-66% of the amount they said would be needed to run the program effectively. While most did say they would find a way to cut back if not given the full funding request, I am concerned that

such a reduction in funding for all/almost all agencies is hobbling their ability to meet expectations in a timely manner (and ultimately impacting their ability to support our community). When granted partial funding they have to take extra time to cut back their program and/or find additional funding. Depending on other grant availability and timelines, their funding options may be limited. If they do manage to get awarded for other funding to bridge the gap, they are obliged to meet those grant expectations and reporting requirement in addition to those of TCC, which takes more time and reduces overall efficiency even further. All of this will delay or permanently hinder their ability to deliver on the agreed upon outcomes. When doing this across the board, we end up with all funded programs starting at a disadvantage, instead of helping the top programs start at full capacity. I am wondering if 50 half-funded programs more beneficial to the community than 25 fully-funded programs. I suggest that in the very least a survey could be conducted of current/former grantees and/or applicants to see if they would rather have the greater chance at being funded (but with the likelihood it will be 1/2 to 2/3 of their need), or a greater risk at not being selected (but if selected would get all/most of their funding ask to be able to start work at capacity). I know another facet of this conversation was how established and well-connected programs are/aren't and how it impacts their application and interview. I agree that it is important that smaller, newer programs not be eliminated solely based on their lack of experienced CEO or grant writer. Perhaps certain criteria could be identified (e.g., organization is smaller than x, program is newer than y, no dedicated grant writer on staff) and some additional technical assistance could be provided those agencies during the application and interview process to help level the playing field. Or if technical assistance isn't feasible, maybe there could be an additional score component that factors in a handicap based off of available resources for competing against larger, establish agencies/programs for funding.

- We had a volunteer in our group with technical challenges. Curious if they attended training
 prior? Since the training was online, I was surprised that they had so much difficulty. It was
 handled well by the staff but did take away from the process. I take this process seriously and
 they didn't seem to as far as engaging with others on critical thinking around the agency and
 the funding goals.
- Hopefully next year evaluations can be done in person and not through video
- Reduced time between initial scoring and interviews.
- Even as a returning volunteer, I thought the orientation was too short and really no time to answer questions. I found the technology challenging with 2 systems (Galaxy and Zoom). The schedule called for an orientation only on the financial part, but that never happened. It was covered in the general orientation, but covered way too fast; once again, really no time for questions.
- It seems redundant to have applicants type in the dollar amounts when they are already submitted on the form and then ask us to go back and check to make sure they typed it in right. Wouldn't it just be faster to have us check the form?
- Know this is a challenge but having volunteers who are representative of the community (age, race, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, etc.) would be beneficial to the process.
- When we were in the interviews and asking the agency representatives questions, I found it
 awkward to ask a question that was not my question. Some questions weren't clear, some
 were irrelevant and some required context that I did not have. That being said, I don't know
 how to fix that other than better editing which is time consuming.
- I think you need to rethink how you do the points for financial during the interviews. Either eliminate or specifically ask a financial question. Just blanketly giving them points if it is not discussed doesn't make sense to me.
- Ensuring consistency of instructions for the scoring that takes place immediately following the agency interview.

- Nothing.
- Articulate the process for allocating funding between the strongest and weakest proposals
- Would love to move back to in person for next year!
- Just be sure someone is "monitoring" all the scoring sessions, so as to assure the different groups of evaluators are working with the scoring system in a like manner. I know you know this.
- More funding concern about gap between what agency funding needs versus amount available for funding.
- I enjoyed the opportunity to do it in person for the consensus meeting!
- Keep a virtual option.

General Comments

- I know that involving the community in funding allocation is extra work and complication, but I very much respect Tempe for engaging members of the public in the process. I liked the breakdown in points for interview scoring, it made it feel less arbitrary/more objective. One of the discussions at the allocation meeting was the scoring patterns in new volunteers vs. tenured volunteers. Perhaps training could include a preemptive acknowledgement of this discrepancy so new volunteers understand the impact of their scores and how it might negatively impact agencies if they are overly generous with their points. You could also consider providing some hypothetical examples for volunteers to review (good applications, red flags, etc.) to provide them context for their scoring as they get into it. As mentioned above, it might also be helpful to discuss the discrepancy in grant application resources for large, established orgs vs small, new orgs. I can't recall if this Needs and Assets is provided as part of orientation/training materials, but that could provide helpful context as well for reviewers. I noticed that some of the reviewers that come from private sector leadership were much more critical of budget/outcome details than people from social service/non-profit backgrounds. Not sure if this varied perspective is considered an unqualified asset to Agency Review, but it might be worth discussing any differences between private and public sector in orientation (or providing written info) before review starts. Lastly, I wasn't able to participate in all of the Lunch & Learns but would have liked to get all that info. Making a recording available would be great. Not sure if it has been considered to offer those not all on the same day of the week, or not all at the same time, in order to make it possible for other people to attend if they have a consistent time constraint.
- Overall, it was a good experience. The more I participate, the more I get concerned about all
 the agencies that are applying and the actual impact on the City of Tempe. The funding
 priorities are far-reaching and any non-profit could fall under the priorities. It feels like there
 are too many people wanting the funding. I am starting to wonder if larger gifts to fewer
 agencies that are based in and primarily serve Tempe could move the needle more.
- The improvements in year over year change from 2021 to 2022 were excellent.
- The review of the applications was much easier this year. I am not sure if changes were made or if I just felt more sure of what I was doing.
- I was surprised and a bit disturbed that an agency I scored high almost didn't get funding because of low scoring by two other reviews. I felt they were overly critical. Both of them seemed to be "pros" in this field. I am glad a City staff moderated them.
- Reviewing financials is challenging
- The overall process went well.

- All was good, but I do wish the final consensus meeting were, in fact, based upon "consensus" vs. voting. It was very clear consensus had been reached, without the need for voting. The word "efficiency" was mentioned several times. This would have been more efficient.
- Application review process still not very comfortable reviewing the financials. Would recommend having people with expertise in this area to do the review for all.
- Ample time was given to review the applications prior to the interviews. The zoom meetings
 made those interviews a bit more challenging, but Kim and the staff and board members
 helped us through the process in an efficient manner. the better part of the consensus
 meeting was training. the formula developed over the years seemed to be the best way to
 proceed.
- It's opened my eyes to the need for additional human services funding through this process. I learned so much about need and what the city is actively doing to address so many different areas of concern.
